STATEMENTS ISSUED THIS WEEK BY THE RECTOR ABOUT DEANERY
STAFFING AND THE MAKIN REVIEW AND THE RESIGNATION OF THE
ARCHBISHOP OF CANTERBURY

Deanery Staffing:

During the past two years of my time as Area Dean, my work in that role has been dominated by an exceptional number of vacancies in clergy posts. Ewhurst, Okewood Hill and Forest Green (commonly referred to as the EOFG Parish) has been vacant for almost 2 years, since the Revd Claire

Shepherd left in January 2023. Previously, they had been through a difficult period of turmoil since the creation of that new Parish 7 years ago. Dunsfold and Hascombe Parishes have been in vacancy for three years, since the resignation of the Revd Ian Maslin, (although for much of that time they have been ministered to, as you will be aware, by the Revd Rutton Viccajee on an interim basis.) Rutton left that role in January this year. Bramley has been vacant since the Revd Andy Davis left last Christmas (their third vacancy in less than 10 years), and Grafham has been vacant since the retirement of the Revd Camilla White in June. There is also a vacancy in Albury after the retirement of the Revd Andrew Pearson, but this is currently being absorbed by the rest of the Shere Benefice of which Albury is a part.

The good news is that we have now made two really good appointments. The Revd William Davie has been appointed Vicar of Bramley and Grafham, with the reuniting of those two parishes. Coming with his young family from a curacy in Rochester Diocese, William will be Inducted in January. Meanwhile, the Revd Canon Shane Griffiths has been appointed as Rector of Dunsfold and Hascombe as a half time post, and coming from the Diocese of Truro with his wife, will be inducted in February.

However, it has been less easy to make an appointment of a House for Duty Priest for the EOFG Parish. The post has been advertised 3 times and, disappointingly, there have not been any applicants. There is a national shortage of clergy, and in some dioceses vacancy rates are running as high as 50%. But more significantly, I feel that in this case we were asking too much, for a House for Duty priest to be responsible for 3 churches and a PCC was a huge 'ask'! Consequently, it has been necessary to think 'out of the box' and to come up with a Plan B. After much discussion there is now a plan, which became public at a meeting in Ewhurst last night, hence the need for me to communicate with you today. It must, however, be recognised that there are a number of legalities to be gone through before the plan becomes reality. In a nutshell, the proposal is:

- That EOFG Parish be dismantled to it's pre 2017 status Okewood Hill and Forest Green will become a Parish which will be returned to Dorking Deanery and Archdeaconry, under the care of Area Dean Revd Peter Nevins. Ewhurst meanwhile will return to being a stand-alone parish in its own right.
- There will be a growing relationship between Ewhurst and Cranleigh, in which I will be appointed as Priest in Charge of Ewhurst, whilst retaining my role as Rector of Cranleigh.
- The Revd Rosemary Mason, a retired Priest, resident in Ewhurst, will continue to lead some of the worship in partnership with me, and will also continue to offer some pastoral care, chaplaincy to The Old Rectory and liaison with Ewhurst CofE Infant School.
- Other services in Ewhurst will be led by myself and the Cranleigh Team.
- Soon after the legalities have been completed, we will be seeking to appoint a House for Duty Priest to live in Ewhurst Rectory and to assist with ministry across the two parishes.

The Makin Review and the subsequent resignation of the Archbishop of Canterbury:

You will all be aware of the publication last week of the Makin Review into the handling of the terrible safeguarding issues surrounding the late John Smyth. This report has three important ramifications for us as a parish and as part of the Guildford Diocese:

• The raising of awareness of just how vital it is that we take safeguarding seriously. As a parish, we have always had an awareness of safeguarding high on our agenda, and our effectiveness in this area will continue, being reviewed and assessed annually. John Smyth should have been apprehended and brought to justice during his lifetime. There were

systemic failings in, I believe both church and the police, which meant that this didn't happen. I do, however, believe that were another John Smyth to operate today, such massive improvements in the way that we deal with these things now, would mean that this could not happen again. And this is the good news!

- Bishop Andrew, as one of Smyth's victims, has been at the centre of media attention this week. He and Beverley and their family need our prayers and support at this time, when the whole matter is in the public eye.
- The loss of Justin Welby, as Archbishop of Canterbury, is a deep sadness to me. That said, I understand why he has felt it necessary to take this step. I believe that Archbishop Justin leaves a huge legacy in what he has achieved across the last decade, particularly as a player on the world stage, and in what he has achieved thus far in the work of bringing the church in line with modern thinking on a number of important issues. I very much hope that in the history books, his tenure of this Office will be defined by his achievements, rather than by the manner in which he has left office. Our prayers are also needed for Justin, and his wife Caroline, as well as for those responsible for appointing the next Archbishop of Canterbury.

I think it is useful to copy here, Bishop Andrew's statement published this week:

Statement on the Makin Review from the Bishop of Guildford:

"I was grateful to receive an early copy of Keith Makin's Review last Monday, along with other UK victims of the abuse perpetrated by John Smyth. That has given me the chance to read the report before its full publication, which has been both an enlightening and a deeply harrowing experience.

Some of what is in the Review I lived through myself, and these sections ring true to my memory and help to fill in some of the gaps. More I have learnt since the Channel 4 documentaries in 2017 and the subsequent book by Andrew Graystone. Still more was completely new to me, including most of

the details of the thirty-five years from the time in early 1982 when I and a fellow victim first reported Smyth's beatings to Mark Ruston.

There is much here that is deeply shocking, especially the abuse of so many victims in Africa, following the disastrous decision of the Iwerne and Winchester College establishments to cover things up. As the Report outlines, those attempts were flawed from the start, and any idea that Smyth's behaviour could be regulated was hopelessly naïve. Smyth's combination of charm and menace, narcissism and manipulation, hypocrisy and violence, made him a very dangerous man indeed, and entirely uncontrollable by any normal means.

I cannot speak on behalf of the other victims and wouldn't presume to try. Some of them went through far worse than I did, and others have understandably found it hard to relate to someone who is simultaneously a victim and a senior representative of a church that has so badly let them down. I am aware of those tensions in myself too and have had very much to reflect on since 2017. Those reflections have fed into a determination to adopt a relentlessly victim-centred approach here in Guildford Diocese.

I am especially aware that the Makin Review may stir up particularly deep feelings for some who read it, especially any victims of grooming and abuse themselves, who may have a similar story to tell. There is support available from a number of organisations.

Above all else, though, I do want to express my deep sadness at all that has happened, and my admiration for those have doggedly persevered in having the truth told. The Report won't make for easy reading for anyone involved: but it's my hope and prayer that it might bring at least some measure of relief to Smyth's victims — British and African, known and unknown — as well as providing salutary lessons as we redouble our efforts towards building a safer Church."

POSADA IN ADVENT Posada is a Spanish word that means 'inn', and is also the title of a Mexican Advent celebration in which two young people dressed as Mary and Joseph travel from house to house in their village to proclaim the imminent arrival of Jesus and request that the newborn baby be given a room. On Christmas Eve they re-enact a community play and bring figures of Mary and Joseph to be placed in a crib at church. This idea has been adapted so that nativity figures travel round a parish, staying at a different house/location every night, and finally taking their place in the church crib at the Crib Service, ready to celebrate the birth of Jesus Christ on Christmas day. They travel with a folder of suggestions for prayers and activities, and a journal for diary entries and pictures if you wish to add them in. In conjunction with the Nativity Festival at St Nicolas we will again have the opportunity to join in with this celebration. Individuals/families/ establishments ie schools/businesses are invited to sign up to host the Holy Family for a night and it is hoped that when you arrange the handover for the next day that you will either offer or receive some hospitality in the form of

perhaps a cup of tea, or even a meal (rather than dumping the set on someone's doorstep). This is a chance to offer a little hospitality to perhaps someone outside of our usual circle of friends and for us to be reminded that we need to make room for Jesus in our lives, homes and communities. 





